MISS BRYANT IS FETED WEDNESDAY

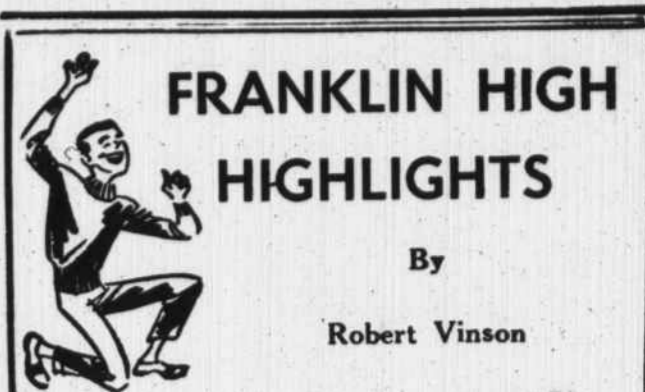
