### UPPER HOKE HAPPENINGS

There was very little snow sown in this neighborhood in account of the extreme drought but what was planted is doing. Quite a lot of oats will be in this spring.

We have had the biggest floods in creeks and rivers that have been quite a while. All car traffic is tied up on account of high water.

Miss Mary A. McNeill, of Vass, died of pneumonia last night week, and was buried in the press on Monday. Miss McNeill was 74 years old. She was a daughter of J. Hector Smith.
