Cotton is not the principal money crop here by a long way, but several hundred bales were shipped since the first of the month.

Three carloads went out on Monday and there will be more to go this week. West End, Eagle Springs and Candor have shipped large quantities of cotton this winter and a large part of the cotton was shipped to Ellerbe, Rockingham, Tryon and High Falls mills. The States are now manufacturing more than half its cotton crop. We need more mills; we have water power and labor is cheap on account of living conditions. Excellent climate.

The peach business is going to demand more track here, and an increase in incoming freight rates. Press is going to necessitate a depot. Why not make a more extensive extension of the track, or so the depot and side-switch could be placed in a more desirable location.
