With final figures available on the results of the dairy development compaign conducted in North Carolina this past year, the supply of improvevd stock added to the dairy farms has been increased by 1,483 animals. Of this number 820 were of pure bred, registered stock, divided into 261 bulls and 559 females.

The campaign was begun last September by the office of dairy extension at State College. Farm agents in 30 counties took an active part in the movement and made reports of their work.
