

SEVEN CHANGES MADE IN THE NEW PONTIAC.

Oakland Motor Car Company announces seven improvements, designed to make the new series Pontiac Six more powerful, faster and more flexible of operation.

Major changes include a new carburetor, new intake manifold, new air deflector, higher gear ratio, larger tires, smaller wheels, and smart new Duco colors on the sport landau sedan.

Outstanding among the new improvements is a one-inch carburetor of the approved type used on the Oakland All-American Six. Not only is it simpler of adjustment and more accurate than the old type, but increased speed, power, acceleration and fuel economy are achieved by its use in conjunction with the new manifold and gear ratio. Connected with the carburetor is a new mushroom type air deflector.

The intake manifold has been changed to accommodate changes in the carburetor, and the rear axle gear ratio stepped up to 4.3 to 1. Marked improvement in every phase of performance is instantly noticeable, behind the wheel, with a higher top speed and an ample reserve power at all driving ranges.

With the increase in gear ratio, the rate of piston travel is still considerably less than that of any other car in the low priced six cylinder field. Thus Pontiac retains an advantage it has held since its introduction: minimum of wear of moving parts, which means longer life for the car.

Greater beauty and a big car appearance, in line with the current vogue, is achieved by the use of larger 29 by 5 inch balloon tires and smaller wheels with ten sturdy spokes, and a larger 7 1-4 inch hub flange. The larger tires result in greater riding comfort and lessening of tire wear.

Simultaneous with these mechanical changes is the announcement that the smart sport landau sedan will take on new dress. The body will be of a dark Standish green Duco, with fenders of lighter Virginian green—a combination similar to that now used on the Oakland All-American cabriolet. Wheels are in natural wood finish.

Special sport equipment, consisting of a trunk rack and six wire wheels with tires, also is available for the first time on a low priced six. Spare are mounted in front fender wells on either side of the car, while non-corrosive chrome plated rims add a brilliant touch of color to the swanky model. New and distinctive bumpers also are available.

In view of the bettered performance and new beauty effected by these changes, it was felt in automotive circles here that the Pontiac Six would take on an added spurt in the record setting pace it has consistently maintained since its introduction.

WITH HIS STRIPES WE ARE HEALED.

Isaiah 53:5.

If my readers remember, I promised them in the beginning of these articles that I would stick to the word of God. I also promised my Heavenly Father years ago that I would not shun to declare the "whole counsel of God" as it was revealed to me. That is why I have chosen the subject of "Devine Healing" this week. Jesus said "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works; and glorify your Father which is in Heaven."—Matt. 5:16. In the first place we wish to explain what "good works" mean here. So many good people have brought this subject of "good works" to me to prove that WE must Do something when we get sick; because the Bible says "Faith without works are dead," which is Scriptural and true, but let's see what kind of works God wants us to do.

We read in the 6th chapter and 28th verse of St. John, "Then said they unto Jesus, what shall we DO that we might work the works of God? Jesus answered them: "This is the work of God, that ye believe on Him whom He hath sent." So faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God. Romans 10:17.

That is why we should take heed to what we hear, especially what the Spirit saith to us—either by His word, or His voice which He speaks to our inner ear. We want to request our readers—especially those who are sick and need healing—to search the Scriptures and find out what Jesus taught us to do. Remember His word is for us today, for He is the same yesterday, today and forever. Hebrews 13:8.

When He was here on earth in person He healed all that had need of healing. I wish each reader would

take time and read the 8th chapter of Matthew; also the 5th chapter of Mark, and notice especially the 26th verse of Mark down to the 34th verse. This was the Scripture the Spirit used to convince me that Devine healing was for us all today. I had been ignorant of God's power and willingness to heal today, as when He was here on earth. I didn't know His word said. It was His Spirit that would quicken our mortal (not immortal) bodies. Romans 8:11. The first time I ever heard Devine healing taught that Jesus could and would heal us without remedies. I said that is rank fanaticism. I will not accept it. And like many others do, I turned God's Holy word down for man's ways and works, but for two long years I suffered untold suffering all because I rebelled against the word of God. Like the prodigal son I came to myself, and decided I would search the Scriptures. I began to read the New Testament through. I was anxious to know what the word of God said about healing. I remember how the 8th chapter of Matt. struck me where it said Jesus healed all that needed healing and not a word about remedies in it. When I got to the 5th chapter of Mark and 26th verse I was thoroughly convinced of Christ's power and willingness to heal without remedies or help except "As thy faith is so be it unto thee."

I continued to read and study the New Testament until I got to St. James, 5th chapter, beginning at the 13th verse on down. I found the only remedy God gives us to use when sick, which is "the prayer of faith."

I know this is not an up-to-date doctrine by no means, for only a very few Christians go by it, but it is God's word—and I love it; and live it, and wish to tell it at home and abroad—by my voice and my pen—that Jesus heals today the same as when He was here on earth, if we will come to Him in faith. I am not writing any man's theory, but God's word and my own experience. His word says ye are my witnesses, Isa. 43:10, again in Psalm 107:2. Let the redeemed of the Lord say so. I thank the Lord for being His redeemed—spirit, soul and body—according to 1st Thess., 5th chapter, 23-24 verses and for being His witness. I know this is not a popular doctrine by no means, for man and his ability is left out—it is Jesus alone, for instead of the word of God telling us to send for the doctor if we get sick. The word tells us to call for the Elders of the church—God's truly anointed people—and let them pray over us. Anointing us with oil in the name of the Lord, and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise us up—and the only works we are called on to do is to confess our faults (sins) one to another and to pray one for another—that ye may be healed—James 5:16.

I wish to take this opportunity to praise the Lord for being my only physician for nearly 29 years. On

the 9th of September, 1899, I surrendered up everything to God and presented my body a living sacrifice. I told Him He could heal me or take me home to Glory, whichever He saw fit, for I was done using any kind of medicines or drugs. And glory be to His Holy Name. He did what drugs and patent medicines had failed to do. He healed me! And if I knew how—or rather if I would always obey the laws of God; and of health I would never get sick, but would have Devine health, as some have today. It is a deeper experience than Devine healing. No one ever heard me say I am sick. The enemy attacked my nervous system last winter from being overtaxed with sorrow and cares, but I refused to trust the arm of flesh—but like Job, I trusted God. And Halleluja! He delivered me! Don't we sing, "He is able still to deliver thee?" Then let's be true. Trust and know Him to do it. All glory be to His Holy Name!
