### Dr. Mudgett Advocates Town Manager Plan

good features of management that are so outstanding at Pinehurst, and with such excellent results. The doctor does not favor disposing of the mayor and commissioners, but of permitting them to concentrate their responsibility and effort in some one man who can take the local government in hand, consolidate it and arrange its different departments so they will work together to common ends under one authority, and derive the benefits of co-ordination, quick decision, economies, efficiency, get rid of lost motion that brings too little results, and put community business on a basis that is really business. One of the arguments the doctor advances is that while the town has always so far operated on a harmonious basis, with no political or other antagonisms, the steady increase of population and of diversified interests naturally tends to those conflicts of opinion and inclination that splits communities into factions, and which is not to be desired in a town that has one chief purpose, that of making itself a place to live which will be most interesting to its large clientele of winter visitors.

#### Citizens Discuss Plan.

This project has not been talked about very much as yet, but serious men are discussing it, and at the present inquiry is going on in various directions regarding the methods of government under town management, and as more is known of the plans of communities which have introduced the town manager system of government, more will come to the surface in Southern Pines.

Incidentally it is also talked in different parts of the county that a county manager might be a wise step for Moore. And that has considerable backing which will see that the idea is brought further forward before long.



### Hundreds Brave Rain For Marker Unveiling

battle, and as it raged dictated the terms of surrender of the patriots. Greetings were brought by Col. H. W. Butner, commander of Fort Bragg, on behalf of the war department; by James Boyd, Southern Pines, on behalf of the State Literary and Historical society, of which he is president; on behalf of the Sandhill post, American Legion, Southern Pines, by Roy Pushee, commander; on behalf of Joseph G. Hinson post, Carthage, Charles McDonald, commander. Then came the unveiling of the tablet, which was draped with American flags, by Miss Frances Lorraine Wilcox, of the Horseshoe, Eudora Davis, Sanford, and Marie, Alston Davis, of Wilmington.

On account of the rain, the meeting adjourned to the court house at Carthage. After a sumptuous and elegant basket picnic dinner, furnished by the housewives of Moore County, which was served in the basement of the court house, the exercises were resumed in the court room.

An original poem, in memory of Mrs. Mary Drew Temple Alston, written by Hon. J. McN. Johnson, of Aberdeen and read by him was enjoyed by the audience.

#### Mrs. Whitaker Speaks.

After this Mrs. C. M. Parks, of Tarboro, presented the State Regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Mrs. Chas. R. Whitaker, of Southern Pines, who delivered an interesting address on the aims and purposes of the Daughters. She told how they stood for the best things in the years that have passed and endeavored to inspire a love for higher things, among the coming generations.

She spoke of their handsome new building which is being built in Washington, and that it would be a memorial to the patriots of the past.

H. F. Seawell, of Carthage, introduced Frank Graham, of the University of North Carolina, who made a historical address.

#### Mr. Graham's Talk.

"The Daughters of the American Revolution are to be congratulated on marking today the Alston home where a patriot family, aided by a handful of fellow patriots, resisted a Tory raid, and risked their home, their lives, and even the lives of their children. Down at Elizabethtown the other day the State Regent, Mrs. Whitaker, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Swett participated in marking the spot where sixty-nine Bladen county farmers with muskets held above the low waters of the Cape Fear, forded the river, filed up the ravine in the night and routed three hundred Tories encamped on the heights. The line about that Tory hole and the old rail fence about the Alston home marked the dividing line between those who took their stand for things as they had been and those who waged a revolution for a freer and a fairer day.

"The ideals of the American Revolution, not yet achieved in this republic divide the Whigs from the Tories in 1928. With Mrs. Tyson today we gave the D. A. R. salute to the flag with its pledge to carry on the American Revolutionary fight for liberty and justice for all. No part of the American scene is more testing of our Revolutionary faith than North Carolina today with all our intricate problems of race, industry, peace, freedom of opinion, and equality of opportunity for all our people. The freedom to teach and report the truth as found, the eight months school term, public libraries in every county and the survey of women in industry, are all the retranslated human issues of liberty and justice which divide the Whigs and Tories in 1928 as they did in 1776.

#### A Rallying Place.

"The Alston home, which the Alfred Moore Chaptre of the Daughters of the American Revolution so fittingly marked today, is a rallying place for our American Revolutionary traditions as we gather in patriotic societies and civic clubs not only to commemorate but also to re-enlist in the cause of the American Revolution. This ground is to be our rendezvous for the next advance in the new American Revolution to win something more of freedom of personality and a fairer chance at the good life for all our people."

The speaker referring to the presence of Mr. Connell, a Confederate

soldier, and the members of the seventeenth field artillery of the First Division of the American Army, recalled the heroism of those men and called for a transfer and emulation of this courage in the great human causes of our time. "As we do our day's work and dream our dreams that the farms and factories, school and churches, dynamos and libraries, will join in the building of a more economically productive and a more spiritually beautiful civilization, we will place in the center of it all, not mechanisms but personality, not products but spirit, not the dividends of today but the children of tomorrow, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."
