At Work on Fire Lane Between Two Towns

CCC Forces Cutting Picturesque
Vista Along Old Pinehurst-
Southern Pines Route

During the hunting season the work on the fire lanes along the Fort Bragg boundary has been practically suspended, and the CCC forces moved over to the route along the pole line from Pinehurst to Southern Pines. The route is cut out all the way between the two towns, running through the woods the entire distance except that the Morganton road out of Southern Pines is used to the top of the Cemetery hill. There a straight line follows the line of the telephone poles, but with the wide avenue cut through a new picture is presented which is not only practical as a fire lane, but also is picturesque as a long vista of several miles from the hill-tops of Pinehurst and Southern Pines. It is very likely that one of these days this will become one of the favored bridge trails if it should not ultimately be improved to the point where it can be taken over by drivers as well as riders of horses. The outlook is so attractive that it is worth while to stop on the hill above Southern Pines just to catch the glimpse of that view of the intervening valley, and its introduction of the wide sweep of country between the two villages. The outline of Pinehurst against the sky is particularly pleasing.

From this line another one has been marked out, following pretty closely the survey of Mr. Manning when he laid out the plan for the improvement of the lands owned by Judge Way, Donald Ross and Frank Maples to the eastward of the Mid Pines area. This added line will open the whole heart of the region that contracts with Pinehurst, Southern Pines and Knollwood, and afford an opportunity for riders to traverse the big parkland that is full of charm to those who like to drift about the piney woods and knobs.

of Hemp, and Leighton McKeithen of Cameron as members. These men will serve as advisors to James Davis, the head of the county reemployment bureau, and they will work in harmony with Mr. Page's committee. They are also advisory, but not executive, their function being to help study the plans and methods of carrying out the laws, which are made in Washington, and are compulsory in their execution and in their manner.

These two organizations expect to work in conjunction with the county commissioners and the school board in the attempt to untangle the snarl the county has engaged in. A joint meeting was appointed in Carthage for Thursday afternoon, and this was one of the first approaches of the joint force toward tackling the big questions and the little ones that are troublesome. The new force asks first of all things the backing of the people of the county, not merely in accepting what is done, but in candid suggestion, information, complaint if any have complaint to make, criticism from those who really have anything to criticize, and any other line of talk that will help to gain the end sought. When the individuals who comprise these joint bodies are observed it is to be seen that here is a group of capable and sincere leaders from the various sections who have in mind but the one aim, that of improving the prevailing conditions and bringing prosperity back to Moore county. These men ask the confidence and the support of all the people, and they must have it if they are to accomplish anything. They ask for information from any individual who has any to give pertaining to the matters in hand, to things that might better affairs, to any legitimate complaint that may be offered, and where confidential information is given it will be held as such.

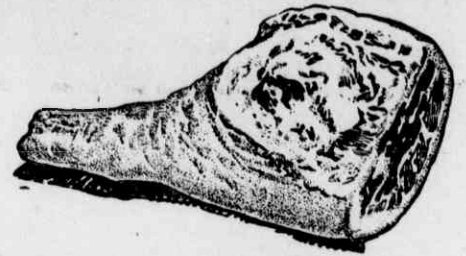
