The spurt in motor vehicle purchases made in the last quarter of 1933 is reflected in the figures which show that on December 31, 1933, licenses issued in North Carolina reach. ed 405,269, as compared with 374,604 three months earlier, October 31, and a fair increase over the number issued a year before, 393,730, to December 31, 1932, it is shown by the records in the office of L. S. Harris, director of the motor vehicle bureau.

non-resident registrations of automobefore, and 1250 non-resident trucks, fore. Motorcycles numbered 1151 at days. the end of 1933 and 1140 at the end of 1932, the records show.

Moore county had 3,100 passenger cars and 775 trucks at the end of 1933, as compared with 3,300 passenger cars and 775 trucks a year before, October 31.

These figures are obtained by measuring and calculating in inches the numbers of registration cards on file in the office and are within half a dozen of the actual numbers of cars registered.
