COUNTY FINANCES IN FINE SHAPE, **AUDITOR REPORTS**

John C. Muse Pays Tribute to Commissioners at Kiwanis Meeting

HIGH RANK IN STATE

Citizens and tax payers of Moore county need have no qualms about their county finances, John C. Muse, county auditor, told members of the Kiwanis Club at their weekly meeting Wednesday in the Pinehurst Community church. In fact, they have just cause for pride.

Stating that Moore nas a debt of less than two per cent of its assessed valuation, Mr. Muse told the Kiwanians their county ranked 11th among the 100 counties of the state in ratio of debt to valuation and that as a result its bonds are in good demand on a 3 1-4 per cent basis. He told how the county had weathered the storm of depression by being prepared. It was one of the few counties in this section of North Carolina which did after the crisis, due to sound financial policies and proper bookkeeping sioners.
