Thomas Sloane Guy, Jr. One of Dozen Elected to Golden Bough Honorary Society

Thomas Sloane Guy, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Guy of Carthage, is one of the twelve men recently elected to membership in Golden Bough, Wake Forest College honorary society.

Guy, a junior in the academic school, has distinguished himself at Wake Forest scholastically, in publications work, in music, forensics, and religious work.

In his first year at Wake Forest Guy was a member of the News Bureau, and was for two years on the staff of Old Gold and Black, student newspaper, and The Student, literary-humorous magazine.

He is president of the glee club, in which he sings first tenor. He is a member of both the church and student choirs and plays the base drum in the college band.

Guy has been active in the work of the Philomathean literary society, of which he is now vice-president. Last year he was one of the two Founders' Day orators and this year he won the Society Day oratorical contest.

In the field of religious activity, Guy has for two years been a member of the Baptist Student Union Council. As a student, he consistently makes the honor roll and is an assistant in the English department of the college.
