F. M. Osborne To Speak at Civic Club Today

Will Talk on "Streamlining Education." Is Here in Interest of Boys' School Project

There will be a meeting of the board of the Civic Club at the club house on Thursday morning, April 7th, at 10:00 o'clock, and all officials and chairmen and vice chairmen of committees are expected. No other notice will be sent. Changes will be made in the by-laws and confirmed at the regular meeting of the club on Friday at 3:00 o'clock.

This afternoon, Friday, at 3:00 o'clock, after a brief business meeting, the club is introducing to Southern Pines and vicinity Francis M. Osborne, Charlotte educator, who will speak on education in its new form, and all are invited to attend. His subject will be "Streamlining Education," followed by a group discussion lead by Mr. Osborne on trends of education which were set in motion by the depression, and are now being discussed in all parts of the country.

The Civic Club is taking advantage of Mr. Osborne's presence here in the Sandhills to lead this meeting, and feel that it will be a great benefit. He is here for the purpose of organizing a committee of local citizens of Southern Pines and Pinehurst to co-operate with a committee of his board, in locating a preparatory school for boys in this vicinity. Mr. Osborne is Executive Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Preparatory School project, incorporated under the laws of North Carolina, as a non-profit interdenominational enterprise. Already available sites and buildings are under consideration.
