NO CIVIL FLYING OVER BRAGG DURING WAR MANEUVERS

The Civil Aeronautics Authority at Washington this week forbade civil aircraft from flying in the vicinity of Fort Bragg until after midnight October 2.

The order was issued for duration of a phase of anti-aircraft artillery practice at the fort. Three regiments of artillery and planes from Langley Field, Va., will participate in the mock war.

Civil flights are banned in an area 25 by 20 miles in the Fort Bragg region. The Raleigh and Charleston radio ranges also were realigned to keep planes flying the beam well to the east of the shooting.

Explicit instructions to aircraft were sent out on the teletype to airports.

NORTH CAROLINA DAY AT NEW YORK WORLD'S FAIR

A "North Carolina Day" at the New York World's Fair of 1939 was proposed to the exposition officials by Coleman W. Roberts, State exhibit director, Director R. Bruce Etheridge of the Department of Conservation and Development said yesterday.

Roberts, who has spent more than a week in New York City conferring with architects and designers for the North Carolina exhibit, advised Etheridge yesterday he expected to get the day featured throughout the exposition grounds.

Plans call for attendance by Governor Hoey and his staff, other State officials and North Carolinians. A parade will feature outstanding bands and drums and bugle corps from the state.
