Exceptionally Low Fire Loss Record in Sandhills **Proves Value of Publicity**

Practically Clean Slate in Three Sandhills Towns This Year, Few Losses Last

"Fire Prevention Week," designed to impress upon the public the hazards of fire are achieving splendid results. These campaigns, if such they can be termed, have received whole-hearted support in editorial publicity and adequate aid in advertising by insured and insurers.

The dangers of the neglected cellar, the dusty attic and accumulations of trash have been reiterated so that the lesson taught by widespread publiciy is at last bearing fruit. Semi-annual inspections by fire department officials show splendid results in the absence of recognizable causes for fire.

The fire departments of the three Sandhills towns of Aberdeen, Pinehurst and Southern Pines have practically clean slates for the year 1938. While they have answered many still alarms, nearly all of which were for threatening grass or brush fires endangering adjacent dwellings, no serious damage has been recorded. Aberdeen's last serious fire, that of the Farrell block on December 27th caused a loss of approximately \$3,-500; Pinehurst's, a \$10,000 loss in the burning of the stables on the night of November 2nd, and Southern Pines a loss of about \$1,500 in the partial destruction of the home of Prof. T. U. Connor of the West Southern Pines schools.

Follow These Simple Rules and Fire Losses Will Be Cut to Minimum

Don't pile trash in cellars, nor near the house.

Watch disposal of matches and lighted smoking materials; they are responsible for a heavier annual loss than any other known cause-always keep matches out of reach of small children.

Use proper fuses in electric circuits; the fuse is the safety valve of the system and should not be tampered with. Turn off electric flat irons and other electrical devices if you have to leave them for even a moment.

Gasoline and other volatile liquids make dangerous cleaning fluids: use the safe compounds on the market, including carbon tetrachloride, which is obtainable at any drug store.

Defective chimneys and flues caused nearly \$20,000,000 destruction last year; keep them clean and in repair.

Walls, ceilings and partitions should be shielded from the overheating of stoves, furnaces and connecting pipes.
