A special election will be held at the City Hall in the Town of Southern Pines on October 24, 1938 from 7 A. M. to 6 P. M. at which there will be submitted to the voters for their acceptance or rejection the bond ordinance passed September 7th, 1938, authorizing \$12,000.00 bonds of the Town for the purpose of purchasing land adjoining the new Post Office to be used as a site on which to erect public buildings which the Town may legally erect and for which it might levy an unlimited tax. AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$12,000.00) LAND BONDS OF THE TOWN OF SOUTHERN PINES, NORTH CAROLINA.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF SOUTHERN PINES:

Section 1. Bonds of the Town shall be issued to the maximum aggregate principal amount of TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$12,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing land adjoining the new Post Office to be used as a site on which to erect public buildings which the Town may legally erect and for which it might levy an unlimited tax.

Section 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds will be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. A statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with the Town Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. This order shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town at an election as provided in The Municipal Finance Act, 1921.

The foregoing Ordinance was passed on the 7th day of September, 1938, and was first published on the 9th day of September, 1938.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said Ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
