

### THREE ARTS GROUP TO WIDEN SCOPE OF ITS ACTIVITIES

To Present Full Length Plays, An Operetta, Art Exhibit, Lectures and Recitals

Less than a year ago a small group of persons resident in the Sandhills conceived the idea of an organization which would actively encourage and promote the various arts in this section. Music, painting and the drama were of especial interest to them.

From small beginnings, in the form of a one-act play, the scope of the group's activities expanded to include a surprisingly successful art exhibit, and later two public productions of a bill of modern American plays with musical interludes. In view of these efforts, the group is planning to widen the sphere of its interests and to develop into a community enterprise of significance to all residents of the Sandhills. This fall the group has succeeded in acquiring a theatre and workshop in Pinehurst. This location has the advantages of being central and readily accessible to all the Sandhill communities.

Plans for the season 1938-39 include productions of three full-length plays, a Gilbert and Sullivan operetta; a second no-jury exhibit at which all workers in the fine arts show their wares; the organization of a children's theatre group; courses in music, playwriting, acting and painting; and the sponsoring of special exhibits, lectures, recitals and other entertainments.

Participation in the group is open to all, and letters have been sent to those in the Sandhills who might be interested in participating — the group's various activities.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones had no children of their own, but they were father and mother to and educated 11 children. Mrs. Jones has just recently died.
