

**Funeral Services For Mrs. Grinnell's Father**

**L. W. Temple Was Prominent Banker and Business Man—Died Last Tuesday**

Funeral services were held last Thursday morning in Lake View, S. C., for L. W. Temple, banker, capitalist, extensive real estate owner, outstanding citizen and business man, who died suddenly on Tuesday, Mr. Temple, father of Mrs. Roy Grinnell of Southern Pines, had spent the day before looking over his properties at Myrtle Beach and when he retired that night he appeared to be in his usual good health.

Mr. Temple was born in Wake county, near Raleigh, on March 3, 1866, and passed his 71st birthday last March. He located in Lake View, then Pages Mills, 50 years ago, and shortly afterwards entered the mercantile business. For many years he conducted a large and successful lien business.

Later he retired from the lien business and devoted his time to farming, fertilizers and cotton. He also became interested in real estate, and in addition to his extensive holdings in Dillon county, S. C., he had acquired much property at Myrtle Beach, Wrightsville Beach, Raleigh, Durham, Kinston and other places.

Although Mr. Temple had long since passed the age when most men seek retirement and relaxation from the cares and responsibilities of an active and successful life, his boundless energy and vigorous mind remained with him till the last and his interest in the world and the affairs of mankind never diminished.

Mr. Temple was an eminently successful man. His judgment was sound and his advice was sought on many matters by many men. He was at one time president of the Bank of Lake View and at the time of his death was one of the receivers of the bank. He organized and was president of the Lake View Deposit, with us in them. And now and then, the Baptist church.

In 1889 Mr. Temple was married to Miss Alice Page, daughter of the late Capt. Joe Page and Mary Ann Ford Page of Lake View. He is survived by his widow and the following children: Joe P. Temple, Lake View; Mrs. W. E. Price, Oklahoma City; Averitte R. Temple, New Orleans; Mrs. L. B. Daniel, New Bern, N. C.; Miss Alima Temple, Lake View; Dr. L. Wade Temple, Lake View; Mrs. Hunter Huss, Gastonia, N. C.; Mrs. Roy Grinnell, Southern Pines, N. C.; Miss Lyall Temple, Washington, D. C. Surviving are fifteen grandchildren.

The funeral, held at the First Baptist Church with interment following at Lake View Cemetery, was attended by many friends and former business associates from the Carolinas, Georgia, Florida and Tennessee.
