BURNING WOODLANDS NO AID IN CONTROLLING FARM INSECTS

It would appear that North Carolina farmers who for years have been burning their woods and fields in the belief that this burning helps to destroy harmful insects, such as ticks and boll weevils, and otherwise helps their land, are all wrong, according to Assistant State Forester W. C. McCormick in charge of Forest Fire Control in the Department of Conservation and Development. The U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, through its Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, has recently informed F. A. Silcox of the U. S. Forest Service, that it does not recommend the burning of woodlands as a means of controlling plant pests and insects, Mr. McCormick said.

"The use of fire is sometimes recommended as an aid in the control of the boll weevil. In such instances it is urged that burning be restricted to places where the fire can be kept under control so as not to endanger trees or buildings.

"Statements from Federal experts on the subject of the use of fire by farmers should convince North Carolina farmers that the burning of their fields and woods is of no value in controlling insect pests and that such practices should be discontinued, Mr. McCormick said. "The farmer who uses fire to destroy insects loses far more cash values through damaged tree growth and soil fertility than he gains by the destruction of a few insects."
