FORT BRAGG WILL OPEN C. M. T. C. CAMP JUNE 14

Preparations are rapidly being completed for the month's session of the Citizens' Military Training Camp which opens at Fort Bragg on June 14. Approximately 650 will attend, including many from Moore county.

The camp will be organized as a regiment of light artillery, consisting of two battalions of three batteries each. The batteries will be equipped with French 75 guns. Supervised athletics also will be a part of the program.

The camp area is under command of Brigadier General William Bryden, commandant of Fort Bragg. Lieutenant James A. Lester, 17th Field Artillery, will be camp executive and under his direction a small group of regular Army officers and enlisted men will carry on administrative functions of the camp. Instruction in military subjects will be given chiefly by officers of the 334th, 335th and 336th Field Artillery.
