## Bargain Sale of Gas Lands Five in Court

### Burke Sold Five Gallons, Stolen From Pinehurst Dairy, for a Quarter

"Five gallons for \$1.00" appears on signs here and there along the highways, but if these dealers think they are offering their customers a bargain, they should know about Robert Burke, white youth of Pinehurst.

Burke, Lloyd Monroe, Judson Cole, Bascom Cole and Jasper Latham were in Recorder's Court Monday, charged with the larceny of a quantity of gasoline from the Pinehurst Dairy, the value of which was less than \$20.

According to the testimony offered, Burke was the one who got the gasoline and others of the group bought from him at real bargain prices. One admitted paying a quarter for five gallons; another had obtained a much larger quantity for which he had paid 50 cents. However, it had not occurred to them that the gas was stolen. Burke being under 16 years of age, his case was referred to the juvenile court. The other defendants paid the costs and their 60-day road sentence was suspended upon further condition that they not violate any law during the next two years and that they be under the supervision of the probation officer for this district.

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## Tobacco Quality Keeps Apace With Quantity

### More Acreage, More Yield Per Acre, Better Grade Leaf, Is Report

Not only has North Carolina increased its flue-cured tobacco acreage 21 percent, but the national acreage of all types has been raised about 12 percent, thus insuring a record large crop, says the Department of Agriculture.

Not only is the acreage greatly increased in North Carolina, but the July 1st prospective production is extra good, according to thousands of growers reporting on recent conditions. While the weather conditions were becoming seriously dry in many sections late in June, general rains have relieved about all localities since. Thus, the crop is again looking as good as it did in mid-June.

The Old Best or Type 11 area reports a 15 percent acreage increase and a prospective per acre yield of 850 pounds which is the highest yield excepting the 885 pounds average for 1935. This belt is now in its primary growing condition.

Type 12 or the New Bright Belt has 25 percent increase in its acreage with the prospective yield of 1000 pounds, which is much above the average and 16 percent more than was harvested last year.

In the Border or Type 13 area the yield indications are for 1080 pounds per acre on 81,000 acres. This is about 12.5 percent increase in yield and 26 percent increase in acre age.

Taking the crop as a whole, North Carolina has a tobacco acreage of about 738,000 acres, a yield of 950 pounds, and a prospective crop of 701,070,000 pounds. This is by far the most any state produces and is the largest production on record for this state. Curing has gotten well under way in the Border Belt and starting in the New Bright Belt.
