



Three of Southern Pines' largest dairies closed negotiations this week with Marvin A. Ray of Southern Pines for the retail distribution of their milk, cream and other dairy products beginning October 1st. Under the agreement. Mr. Ray, through the Sandhill Cooperative Dairy which he has organized, will become the sole retail agent for the products of Snipe's Niagara Dairy, Richard Sugg's Osco Farms, and the Royalton Pines Dairy owned and operated by W. W. Olive.

The plan has been successfully opery to customers throughout the immediate vicinity of Southern Pines. Mr. Ray plans to operate the pasteurizing plant at the Royalton Pines Dairy for those desiring pasteurized
