County Court of Awards To Be Held In Aberdeen School Today, Friday

MANY WINDOW DISPLAYS

Thursday, February 8 through 14 has been set aside as NATIONAL BOY SCOUT WEEK. The Scouts of the Sandhills plan to commemorate the thirtieth anniversary of the foundation of Scouting in America. The various Troops will have a display in some store window in their town and they will remain in place till February 17th so that the County Court of Honor Committee can visit and judge the displays and make awards accordingly. In Southern Pines Troop 3 will show its display at the office of P. T. Barnum, Inc., Troop 4 will show its display at Merrill's Pharmacy and Troop 8 will show its display in some store window in West Southern Pines.

On Friday, February 9 a County Court of Awards will be held in the Aberdeen Public School Auditorium. At this time the various Badges and Awards earned by the Scouts during the past month, will be distributed. The recently reorganized Aberdeen Troop Committee will also be installed at this meeting.

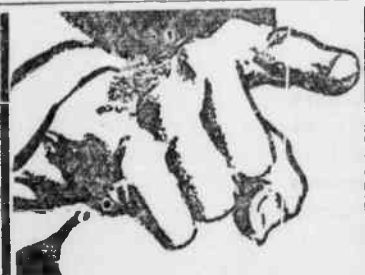
Sunday, February 11 is SCOUT SUNDAY and every boy will be given the opportunity, in his own church, to fulfill the twelfth Scout Law.—A SCOUT IS REVERENT. Special Scout services will be held in Southern Pines at the Immanuel Episcopal Church when the boys of that church will meet and as Scouts will worship with the congregation at the regular morning hour of 11:00. Rev. Voight O. Taylor will, during the Sunday morning service at 11:00, give special recognition to Scouting as a force in the life of the youth of our land. The Catholic Scouts will receive Holy Communion in a body at the eight o'clock Mass at St. Anthony's Church and they will attend special Scout services at 5 p. m. in the church. Scouts of the colored troop of West Southern Pines will be guests of Troop 3 at the evening Scout services at St. Anthony's church. Scout services will likewise be held in Aberdeen, Carthage, Hemp, Pinehurst and Vass in the several churches sponsoring Troops.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce of Carthage is sponsoring a special Scout celebration in the Carthage public school at 8 p. m. on Monday, February 12. Mr. Reynolds, the president of the Oconeechee Council, from Raleigh, Mr. N. L. Hodgkins, Moore county Scout chairman and Rev. Thomas A. Williams, Catholic State Scout Chaplain will be the speakers. The general public is invited to attend.

The Scout week celebrations will close with a mammoth Street Show for all of the Scouts in the county. It will be held in Southern Pines on Saturday, February 17 from 11 to 4 o'clock. It will open with the flag raising ceremony, followed by tin-can-cookery, dinner, knot tying relay, signaling, fire building, string burning, first aid contests and four fun events. Awards will then be made for the best store window display, the most novel campsite, and efficiency in the events. The closing ceremony, flag lowering and taps will close the celebration. It is planned that this will be the largest Scout event ever to be held in the Sandhills.
