**Gov. Hoey Opens "North Carolina Cavalcade", Over WPTF Feb. 16**

**Description of States Pleasure Resorts Will Be Aim Of Series of Talks**

Governor Clyde R. Hoey speaks over WPTF on Friday, February 16 at 11:30 p. m., in the first of a new series of radio programs being presented by the State Department of Conservation and Development in cooperation with station WPTF. Presented weekly, the broadcasts will be the leading gun in a campaign started by Robert Thompson, newly appointed head of the department, to bring new industries and increased tourist trade to North Carolina.

Titled "North Carolina Cavalcade," a combination of drama, music and narration will give a graphic picture of the state. Industrial development and educational facilities will be stressed. Description of the state's pleasure resorts and recreational activities will be aimed at prospective visitors.

Special music has been selected and will include North Carolina tunes and music of the South. Dramatic chapters of North Carolina's history are planned for future programs. The broadcast runs from 11:30 p. m. to midnight each Friday, and listeners will be offered souvenirs and brochures descriptive of the state.

**Peach Trees Reported Not Seriously Damaged**

**Some Orchardists Estimate Only Weak Trees Lost, Says Westcott**

Peach trees in the North Carolina Sandhills survived the recent cold wave "without serious damage to the section as a whole," Harry T. Westcott, marketing specialist of the State Department of Agriculture said recently.

"While some orchardists reported the loss of several trees, others estimate that only the weak trees were lost," he added.

"While the ground was frozen some eight inches deep in the peach section the majority of the trees were dormant thus preventing the freezing of the sap, except in those trees which had an abundant supply of nitrogen and were a little further advanced in this season's growth."

He said that peach buds were little affected also in that only in a few cases was growth sufficient to make them susceptible to damage.

"It is the opinion of some peach growers that the cold wave was of value in that trees were delayed in spring growth, making it safer for them to withstand any future low temperatures that may occur during the next few weeks," he reported.
