

Pinehurst PTA Honors Its Past Presidents

Splendid Reports Heard at Founder's Day Meeting.—100 Paid Members Enrolled

The Founder's Day meeting of the Pinehurst Parent-Teacher Association was held in the school auditorium Tuesday evening with the president, Mrs. Karl Johnson, presiding. Mrs. Johnson reported an average of 70 free lunches and 30 paid lunches being served in the cafeteria daily, and to aid in this work a check for \$150.00 had been received from Mrs. H. F. Kelly, local chairman of the Red Cross. A check for \$13.80 was received from Mrs. T. A. Crowtham as a bonus from the tuberculosis seal sale in which the school children took an active part. This bonus is used to aid in health work in the school, such as first aid supplies.

Mrs. C. E. Fields, membership chairman, reported that she had reached the goal of 100 paid members, and asked that others join.

Mrs. Louis G. Kelly, magazine chairman, reported that the magazine subscription quota had been reached to meet the accredited requirements.

Supt. Harbison reported that he had investigated the possibility of getting W.P.A. aid in securing a paid director of recreation for the youth of the community during the summer and found that funds would have to be provided locally through tax or subscription. The president was instructed to appoint a committee to make further study of this matter.

Miss Eloise Summerford presented Louise McVicker, Betty Dunlop, Beverly Lyon, Evelyn Black Georgia Faircloth, Maxine Kennedy, Virginia Currie and Elizabeth Ann Frye in a pageant, "As Told By Candles," and as each girl lighted her candle she told of some phase of the P.T.A. work. After this the past presidents of the local organizations gathered around a table centered with a white cake bearing 42 red candles and while Mrs. Leonard Tufts, first president lighted the candles she made a few appropriate remarks giving much credit to the success of this organization to Supt. 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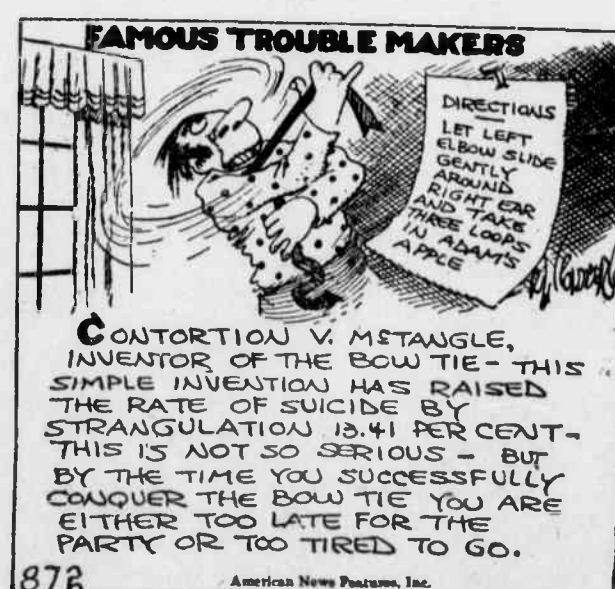
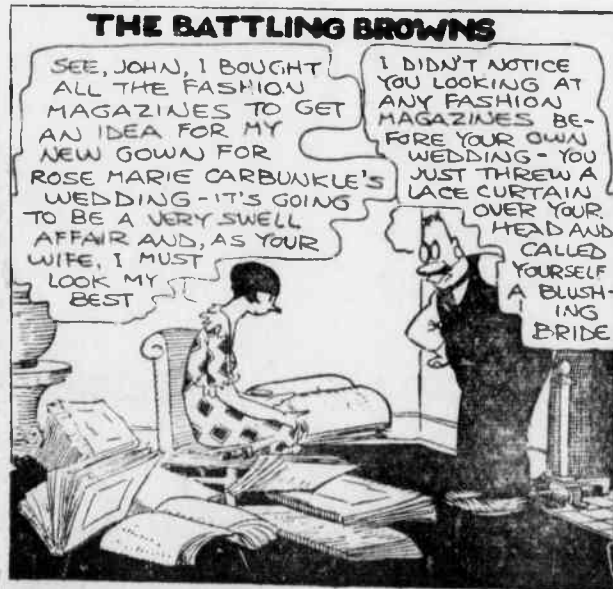
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
