

**RURAL MAIL CARRIER FOR TIMBERLAND WANTED**

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Timberland. The examination will be held at Southern Pines. Receipt of applications will close on November 22, 1940.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard route of 30 miles served daily except Sunday is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$20 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 30 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually residing in the territory of the post office where the vacancy exists, who have been actually residing there for six months next preceding the closing date for receipt of applications, and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 1977.
