**The Weather**

**February Temperature Lower Than Normal, But We Had 13 All Clear Days**

The nearly average temperature of February, 1940, received a drastic reversal during the past month with the surprising loss of 6.1 degrees of temperature; the maximum, 3.8 degrees lower than normal, the minimum, 8.5 degrees less than normal.

Thirteen days were all clear—six more than last February; seven days were partly cloudy, six days cloudy, five days with rain, and a part of the 4th, with flakes of snow and some sleet, a part of the 27th with snow and sleet measuring one and one-half inches.

The heaviest rainfall came on the 3rd, with .88 inches, the total precipitation for the month, 2.25 inches, 1.78 inches less than normal for the month. The deficiency in rainfall for the first two months of the year is 4.96 inches.

Both maximum and minimum daily temperatures fell below normal. Three days, the 4th, 12th, and 23rd, reached a low of 17 degrees while the highest temperature recorded for the month was only 63 degrees, seven degrees below the high of last February.
