## Sanatorium-Moore Co. Hospital Nurses Awarded Their Diplomas

**Graduating Class of Ten Hears Revs. McKelway and Brown in Commencement Addresses**

Commencement exercises for the ten graduates of the North Carolina Sanatorium School of Nursing opened with a baccalaureate sermon at the Community Church in Pinehurst on Sunday evening, May 11. The pastor, Rev. A. J. McKelway, spoke of the work of Florence Nightingale and her successors in service to humanity. "The Lady with the Lamp," he said, exemplified the Biblical admonition to "let your light shine before men."

On Thursday evening the Rev. R. E. Brown, pastor of the Hay Street Methodist Church in Fayetteville, gave the principal address at the graduation exercises in the auditorium of the Sanatorium. He was introduced by C. D. Thomas, assistant superintendent of the Sanatorium, who acted as master of ceremonies.

The speaker chose as his subject "Allies for Every Nurse." The four allies which insure success in the nursing profession, he said, are an understanding of people, a love of beauty, a sense of humor and faith in one's calling.

During the exercises Dr. C. L. Gray of the Sanatorium staff sang several selections, which included "The Lord's Prayer" by Albert Hay Malotte, "Duna" by Josephine McGill and the "Kashmira Song" by Amy Woodforde-Finden. The pianist was Miss Ruth Jones, of Fayetteville.

Dr. P. P. McCain, superintendent of the North Carolina Sanatorium, awarded the diplomas to the graduates, who took their first two years of training at the Sanatorium and their third year's work at the Moore County Hospital in Pinehurst.

In his congratulatory message Dr. McCain said that the nursing profession was unsurpassed in opportunities for service to humanity and personal satisfactions.

In presenting the school pins Dr. C. R. Monroe, surgeon of the Moore County Hospital, spoke of the sacrifices and hard work which the graduates have cheerfully undergone and expressed the conviction that they would continue to assume responsibilities happily and cheerfully. The Rev. Harry K. Holland of Raeford pronounced the invocation and the benediction.

Artistic flower arrangements on the rostrum carried out the hospital colors of green and gold.

Following the exercises the audience was invited to a reception at the Nurses' Home, where the graduates received the congratulations of the commencement guests. The living rooms of the Nurses' Home were colorfully decorated with Spring flowers. The nursing staff served punch and an ice course during the evening.

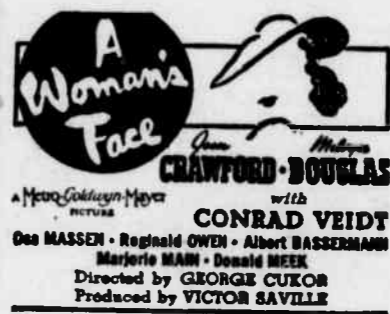

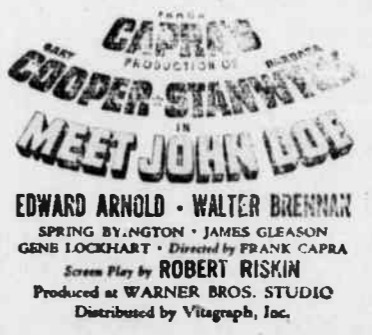
