people. Recently, one of the airplane ambulances, a duplicate of that which the Old North State Fund seeks to purchase, flew to several points in the State, carrying the State Chairman, Fred O. Bowman of Chapel Hill, and the State treasurer, George Ross Pou, State auditor and several others.

Chief purposes of such an ambulance plane is to rescue R. A. F. pilots who may be shot down in the English channel. The ships are Grumman G-21 amphibians, and are exceedingly maneuverable for large ships. Fully equipped for ambulance duty, they can carry four stretcher cases, two sitting cases, a medical attendant, pilot and co-pilot.
