Our COUNTY'S HEALTH

THE HEALTH CERTIFICATE By Dr. B. M. DRAKE, Moore County Health Director

Health certificates are important in the prevention of diseases for two reasons. The first and more obvious reason is that the bearer of a certificate is usually free from communicable diseases, thus protecting the person or persons with whom he may come in contact in the performance of his duties. No health certificate is granted a person who has a communicable disease and, if it is brought to the attention of the health officer that any one with any communicable disease has a health certificate, the certificate is recalled.

Another reason for the importance of health certificates is that it brings to light a great many hitherto-unreported diseases or sources of disease. It is a common experience to discover that an applicant is infected with some venereal disease. Less commonly a typhoid fever carrier may be discovered. Such conditions as itch and various other skin diseases are seen, and occasionally a case of tuberculosis is found.

When such conditions are found efforts are made to bring them under control, thus eliminating a source of disease and improving the public health.

It is realized by the health department that one or even two examinations a year are entirely inadequate, but under the present set-up it would be impossible to examine the many foodhandlers or servants more often. However these persons who have a health certificate should have this renewed when the place of employment is changed.
