

Results of Hearing Tests Are Reported

Few Local Children Found to Have Defective Hearing, Social Council is Told

At the April meeting of the Southern Pines Council of Social Agencies, Miss Cora Beam of the State Board of Health told of the methods used in teaching school children for hearing loss. It is done in groups with an audiometer, then those having 90 percent loss or more are re-tested, Miss Beam said. Of the 388 children tested in Southern Pines, 12 had defective hearing and of 208 tested in West Southern Pines, 6 had defective hearing.

Of these none had enough loss of hearing to necessitate the use of hearing aids or of instruction in lip-reading—but they do need watching and in some cases, removal of adenoid growths.

Miss Beam said that many parents do not realize that children who have had repeated earaches are often left with defective hearing.

In cases where parents cannot afford the necessary medical care, the council is prepared to help them.

The members of the council feel that in helping in this work and in the eye clinic held last fall, they have contributed substantially to the program of Preventative Medicine in the field of Child Health.

Meetings of the Council are held on the second Tuesday of each month.

Palm Sunday Sermon at Saint Anthony's

"Our Lord's Last Days" Is Subject of Message at Catholic Service

On Palm Sunday, Father Harkins spoke on Our Lord's Last Days, basing his sermon on St. Matthew 26:11 "Me you have not always." He said, in part:

"Memory loves to dwell on the details surrounding the death of our departed friends. Their farewell words and messages are remembered and repeated and handed down. They live again in memory. And who deserves such kindly thought whose words and every action should be treasured up, as devoutly and as gratefully as His, who for us and our salvation laid down His life? He seems to appeal to us not to forget Him: 'Me you have not always with you.'"

The pastor described the triumphal entry into Jerusalem as the crowd went forth to meet Him, waving palm branches, and the bitterness of the Pharisee's disappointment when it seemed that the whole world had gone after Him. Then he discussed the miracle of the fig tree.

"There was no fruit, and our Lord cursed the tree, and it withered away," the minister said. "This, our Savior's only miracle of destruction, signified the judgment destined for the deceitfulness of the people, and accords with His prediction of the destruction of Temple, and His calamities that would overtake the nation."

Father Harkins then recounted the efforts of Christ's enemies to stir up the popular fury or the enmity of the Romans, and the greed-prompted offer of Judas Iscariot to betray Him, concluding with these words:

"Before His passion on the cross, our Blessed Lord is shrouded in sacred silence. And in those hours of silence, the events of which are hidden from us, may we not believe that there was a solemn leave-taking between the Mother and the Son? Our Lady's heart had to be nerved and strengthened for the Sacrifice of Calvary. She had to consent, poor broken-hearted Mother, to the death of her Son. She was obedient to the Will of God even to His Death! Thus Mary Immaculate shared in the Redemption of Calvary."
