

Backers Predict Record Vote For Lee Candidate

Dr. F. W. McCracken, prominent Sanfor dentist and chairman of the Horner-For-Congress club, organized to boost the candidacy of W. E. (Bill) Horner, who seeks the Eighth District Congressional seat, forecast on Monday a record vote of more than 5,000 in Lee county in the Democratic primary, May 25. Dr. McCracken predicted that Horner, veteran Lee legislator, would receive 90 percent of his home county vote.

"We have had by far the heaviest registration in history," Dr. McCracken pointed out. "Lee county has cast 4,500 votes in years past, and with interest in Horner's candidacy at high pitch, I believe we will easily surpass the frequently predicted figure of 5,000."

Horner has visited every county in the district many times during the past several weeks. According to Dr. McCracken, has a "going organization" in every corner of the district.

Vets Authorized Special Treatment

Home-town treatment of service-connected disabilities is now available to North Carolina veterans, according to Dr. A. J. Weirick, chief medical officer of the Veterans Administration Regional Office.

Under a contract with the Hospital Savings Association of North

Carolina, Dr. Weirick said, veterans in need of out-patient treatment for service-connected disabilities may be treated in their own home-towns by a doctor of their choice, if there is no VA clinic there.

In announcing that the recently signed contract is now in effect, the VA Medical Officer emphasized that this private medical care is for service-connected disabilities only, and that authorization must be obtained for the treatment in advance.

Authorization may be obtained at the Winston-Salem Office, or through the VA sub-regional or contact offices, Dr. Weirick said.

Two New Legion Posts Formed In Sandhills

Veterans in the West End and Hoffman sections of the Sandhills banded to form two new posts of the American Legion this week, with well above the minimum number of charter members having been enlisted for each post. John H. Stephenson of Southern Pines, American Legion Commander for the 12th District, within which the Hoffman and West End posts are included states that membership for the district has been doubled during the past year. The new organizations will meet for the election of officers in the near future.


