Aberdeen Highway Being Extended

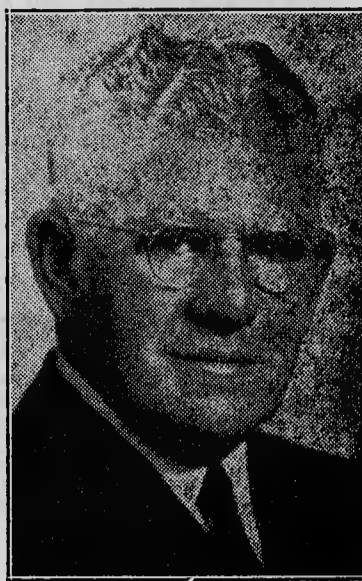
