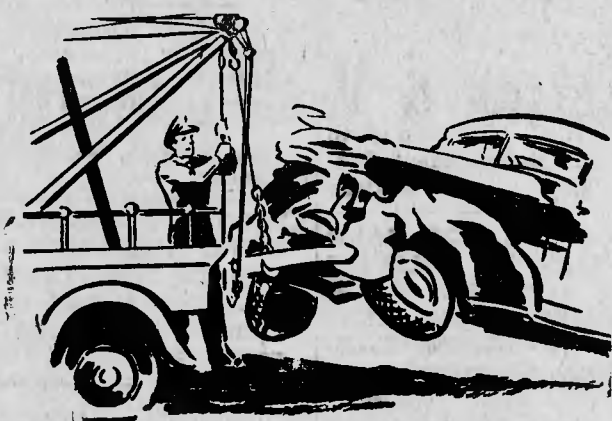

The school is not only picturesquely situated at the base of the Front Range of the Rockies, but it is in the very heart of a rich, natural laboratory and within easy access of coal and metal mines, large oil fields, refineries, smelters, iron works and the like where practical firsthand observations of the mineral and allied industries may be made at all times in connection with regular classroom work.

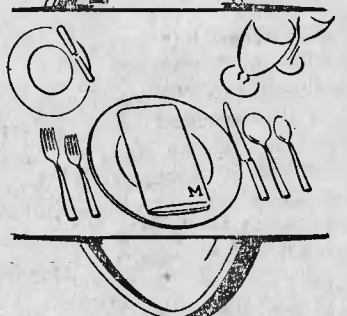

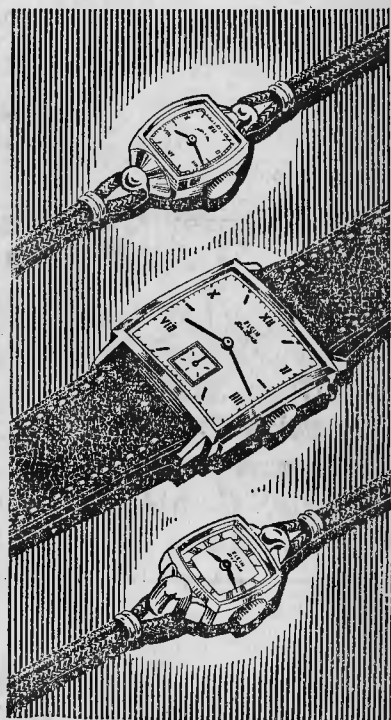

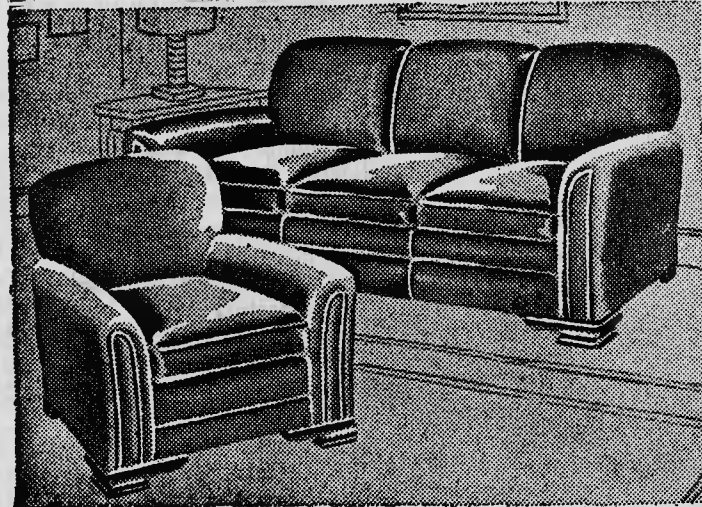
