Aunt Lydia" Passes

The "sweet chariot" swung low just past midnight Friday, and carried home one of this section's oldest and best known colored women, "Aunt Lydia" McKeithen, 85, who was one of the few remaining old-timers who had resided in Vass when the settlement was composed of only a handful of families. She was known to everyone as "Aunt Lyddy" and held a warm place in the hearts of her white friends and those of her own race.

Born in Cameron, "Aunt Lydia" married William McKeithen and came to Vass to live some sixty years ago and this was her home until about three years ago when she went with her grandson, Lonnie McKeithen, and other members of the family to Lakeview to live after their home here was destroyed by fire.

"Aunt Lydia" will long be remembered for her patience in tribulation and her faithfulness to duty. For years before her husband's death he was an invalid and she bravely carried on, caring for him day and night and continuing with the laundry work at which she had for years helped to meet the household needs, turning out miles of snowy garments.

She was rewarded for her faithfulness by the loving care bestowed upon her by her grandchildren during her years of disability.

Funeral services were held at Allen's Chapel Methodist Church, of which she had long been a member, Sunday afternoon with the Reverend Matthews of Pinehurst officiating, and burial was in Green Grove Cemetery near Cameron, with lovely flowers banking the grave.

Surviving are nine grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.
