Civil Service Jobs Open At Oak Ridge

Rep. C. B. Deane of the Eighth Congressional district announced today that the civil service commission is holding open competitive examinations for positions in the U. S. Atomic Energy commission at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

These positions are in the field of electrical trades and vary from chief power system dispatcher, with a salary of \$4,525.80 per year, on down to mechanic helper at 85 cents. Other types of jobs open include sub-station operators, meters and relay technicians, linemen, junior electricians and powerline patrolmen.

Applications must be filed with the office of the board of civil service examiners for the United States Atomic Energy commission, Oak Ridge, Tenn., not later than November 10, 1947.

Paper 102 Years Old Reveals Slavery Burning Issue In Admission Of Texas

Benny Bethea, of 392 Gaines street, West Southern Pines, uncovered an ancient and interesting document while taking an old picture out of a frame at his house recently.

It is a copy—volume 1, number 1, in fact—of the "Free State Rally and Texas Chain-Breaker," published November 15, 1845, for the purpose of protesting the admission to the Union of the State of Texas, under a constitution by which slavery was permitted.

The "Rally," a four-page, three-column sheet about 10x15 inches in size, was to be "published Weekly, or oftener, till the Texas question is settled" by Jordan and Wiley, of 20 State Street, Boston, at a price of 100 copies of one issue, or 10 copies of six issues for \$1. The first issue, however, was to be sent out free to "a large number of persons, scattered in nearly every county in the free states."

Though browned by time like an autumn leaf, the little paper is in an excellent state of preservation, with every word in its tiny type clearly legible.

The leading "address," presenting the issue on all of the front page and two columns of the second, bears the names of such leading citizens of the day as Charles Francis Adams, William Lloyd Garrison, Wendell Phillips, John Pierpoint, Henry B. Stanton, Charles Sumner, of Boston, Samuel E. Sewall, Roxbury; John J. Whittier, Amesbury; Stephen C. Phillips, Salem; and many others.

Editorial matter, news of meetings and resolutions passed at meetings show the issue as a burning one, some 16 years before the War Between the States took place.

In fact, it is difficult now to read the stories of that day, in the light of what we know to have transpired since, and not to wonder why the war was not clearly foreseen at that time.

Weaver Shows Medals At Kiwanis Meeting

Charles K. Weaver, world traveler and enthusiastic hobbyist, originally from New Jersey though now hailing from Miami, Fla., spoke before the Sandhills Kiwanis club Wednesday, October 1, on his collection of medals from many lands.

State Will Pay For Longleaf Pine Cones

Word comes this week that the North Carolina division of forestry and parks is in dire need of green longleaf pine cones and will pay 75 cents to \$1 per bushel for them, in quantities of 30 bushels or more.

They are needed for the seeding of longleaf pines in the state forestries at Clayton and Hendersonville.

Residents of Moore county who know where a supply of the green unopened pine cones may be secured are requested by J. A. Pippin, district forester, to let County Forest Warden E. W. Davis know, by calling Southern Pines 6021 or 7043.
