her sister, Mrs. Talton of Southern Pines, are her mother and two other sisters, Mrs. Exie Smith of Coats and Mrs. R. E. Langdon of Fayetteville.

Applications, was placed before the meeting by the vice president, Hoke Pollock, who specified some of the major projects in which the Chamber is interested. While industry is not sought for 'his resort town, he said, it is sought for the county as a whole, and the town will benefit thereby. He gave it also as his opinion that "a good secretary will earn his salary" in projects promoted, and time saved the members in routine and special work.

Planned beautification of the town with best use of natural assets, he mentioned as a continuing major project.

Members Speak
President Ruggles called on a number present for expressions of their opinion, and some of them follow:

Sam B. Richardson: "When I first came here 42 years ago, the town had a population of 262 people, and as many hogs and cows as people. Progress came through people's pitching in together and working for it. That's what we need now and we can do it."

Charles W. Picquet: "I'm 100 per cent with you."
John Pottle: "We have two choices—we can spend a lot and put this over, or save it all. A little will do no good."
Mrs. James Boyd: "It is important to hold to the beauty of our countryside, which is responsible for most of our success and happiness here."

E. C. Stevens: "All of us agree to the need for such a program, and that our money and interest should be judiciously spent. I hope you go ahead and get a first class secretary to achieve the purposes of the group."
Harold Collins: "I am in favor of a man to plan the work and to work the plan."
Mrs. P. P. McCain: "The foundations of progress were laid by the old Southern Pines Chamber of Commerce years ago. Now we have a lovely town to call home. I am sure the work so well begun in those days can be carried on with success."

C. N. Page: "A man is as he thinketh—and a town is no better than it thinks it is. If you raise your sights and aim high, you can go as high as you wish."

Credit Rating Bureau
With only two ways open to increase the present budget—upping membership dues and adding to the membership lists—a number of ways were suggested by which a trained executive could actually save money for local businessmen so they would find their investment well worth while. One of these was the establishment of a credit rating bureau, such as many merchants' associations support.

Such projects are impossible without a full-time executive, said President Ruggles. In fact, he said, the businessmen on the board, no matter how well intentioned, have little time to spare. "Though the carrying on of the teen-age work alone would have made it all worth while, if there had been nothing else," many worthy projects have failed to reach completion for actual lack of time.

Gariand McPherson, treasurer, said that, with many pledges still uncollected, the Chamber now has a balance of \$1,776.73 on hand. Ruggles presented a number of guests, including Rep. H. Clifton Blue, of Aberdeen, Mayor C. N. Page and Fred Weaver, former resident of Aberdeen, dean of men at the University of North Carolina.
