Deane Stresses Importance of Sound Economy

Rep. C. B. Deane of the Eighth Congressional District addressed the Carthage Rotary club last Thursday night at McDonald's cafe in Carthage on "America's Foreign Policy and World Peace."

The United States is successfully combatting the spread of communism in Europe through the effective operation of the Marshall plan, he said, adding, "If it had not been for this Marshall aid to the democratic countries of Western Europe, the communist steamroller would have already pushed its way to the Atlantic seaboard."

"The success of our foreign policy is closely tied in with the condition of business and agriculture here at home," the congressman declared, "and we cannot continue our strong program of democratic leadership in the world today unless our domestic economic condition will permit such a course of action." For this reason, among others, Mr. Deane indicated that he is definitely interested in keeping our country as solvent and financially strong as possible.

The congressman pointed out that there are numerous pressure groups which keep descending upon Congress trying to get appropriations for various projects, all of which cost money, but he contended that if the people really want to balance the budget, they must be prepared to ask less of the Federal Government.

Mr. Deane pledged his further efforts in Congress in the interest of a foreign policy which will build permanent peace, and a domestic policy which will keep the economy of this country sound.

A large number of Rotarians and other interested citizens from Carthage and over the county were present to hear Mr. Deane speak.
