Pinebluff Girl Scout, 10 Years Old, Shows Heroism In Rescue of Playmate

Little 10-year-old Marilyn Mills was acclaimed a heroine in Pinebluff last week.

Marilyn, daughter of Mayor and Mrs. E. H. Mills of Pinebluff, saved the life of her friend Harriet Schnell, also 10 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Schnell of Pinebluff, showing a courage, resourcefulness and presence of mind that have won her praise from all who have heard what happened at Pinebluff lake Monday afternoon.

As reconstructed from stories of Marilyn and other children present—stories that revealed the fears and heartbreak that only childhood can know—this is what occurred:

Marilyn, and three other Mills children, Johnny, 7, Pricilla, 5, and Arthur, 4—with Harriet and her little brother, Joseph, 4—had gone to Pinebluff lake where a new dam has been under construction, about 4:30 Monday afternoon.

On the dam, Harriet attempted to pull up a board that extended up from the spillway. Losing her balance she fell 10 or 12 feet head first, striking her head on a plank and rolling over, unconscious, into about two feet of water in the channel. The dam gates have not yet been closed. A stream runs through the lake bottom and out the spillway.

Marilyn said that Harriet floated face down in the water. The terrified Mills child, who found herself alone and also felt responsible for the smaller children with her, struggled down over big lumps of broken masonry on the inside face of the dam and dragged Harriet out of the channel water. The injured girl, who did not regain full consciousness until 7:30 Monday night, then crawled back into the water, not knowing what she was doing. Marilyn dragged her out again.

Both the children are Girl Scouts and have studied first aid. So Marilyn splashed water in Harriet's face. The Schnell girl recovered sufficiently to walk a short distance but then collapsed. Marilyn said that she then planned to send one of the little children for help but shortly thereafter James Parrish of Pinebluff drove by and stopped. He took the Schnell girl home where she was put under a physician's care. Reported much better, Harriet
