Rotarians Hear Of Plans For Safety Campaign

The Rotary club's sponsorship of the June safety campaign, in cooperation with the Southern Pines Safety Council, was the subject of a talk made by Garland Pierce, safety chairman, at the Rotarians' weekly luncheon meeting at the Village Inn Friday.
He told them of the "reactor machine" which would be on duty downtown through courtesy of the Aetna Life Insurance company, to test the individual's reaction time, important in the emergency stopping of a car. Rotarians were detailed to staff the machine for a Saturday morning demonstration. Safety films were shown at both the Southern Pines and West Southern Pines schools last week in connection with the campaign, said Chairman Pierce.
He also made a report, as official delegate, on the district Rotary convention held at Myrtle Beach the previous weekend.

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
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
