NOTICE OF PROPOSED ORDI-NANCE AMENDING CHAP-TER "O" OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF SOUTHERN

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF SOUTHERN PINES,

Chapter O of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Southern The other provisions of the new Pines be and the same is hereby law, extending social security amended by rewriting the first sentence of Section 8 and paragraph (a) thereof and by adding Section 13 to read as follows:

Section 8. Business District. The following street frontages and to a depth of the building lot or one hundred fifty (150) feet from the front property line, whichever is the shorter shall constitute the business district.

(a) West Broad - Both sides from Vermont south to the corporate limits, to the depth of the building lot or one hundred fifty (150) feet from the front property line, whichever is the shorter, on the west side of West Broad and to the railway right-of-way on the east side of West Broad."

"Section 13. Industrial District. The area comprised within the corporate limits south of Illinois Avenue, and west of Ashe Street, and east of the business district on West Broad Street shall constitute the Industrial District. No building within the industrial district used or designed to be used for industrial pur-poses shall be erected or used, nor any premises used for industrial purposes hereafter, until the owner thereof obtains written permission from the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Southern


All the property owners having property within or adjacent to the above described areas take notice that a meeting will be held by the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the Town of Southern Pines at the usual meeting place of the Board at the Town Hall on the 13th day of September, 1950 at 8:00 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of hearing objections to the final passing of the above-mentioned ordinance. In case of a protest against such proposed ordinance signed by not less than twenty (20%) per cent of the owners of property within the above-described areas or of those directly adjacent in the rear thereof extending one hundred feet therefrom, or of those directly opposite thereto extending one hundred feet from the street frontage of such opposite lots or property such amending ordinance shall not become effective except by favorable vote of three-fourths of all members of the


