Farmers Home Administration Makes Various Types of Loans To Farmers

Agency Helps Moore Families Diversify Farm Production

Moore County farmers are turnng to the Farmers Home Admin- At Local Office istration office at Carthage for credit that will help them adopt adjustments from cash-crop farm-C. Lingerfelt, the agency's county supervisor, said this week.

Farmers who have depended almost wholly on cash crops in recent years are the ones most in need of farming adjustments, he said. They find they can set up a switching to diversified production, a gain of 7.83 per cent. tion on their farms. Many are looking for credit necessary to put with their crops and are expect-\$8,429.48. ing to develop good pasture for their livestock. This type of adjustment usually takes a few ed out.

Many operators of cash-crop farms say they are held back from making the adjustments because of costs involved, Mr. Lingerfelt said. Emergency Loans In addition, many farmers needing loans for only a year, or emergency loans in designated areas, are finding the credit they need at the Farmers Home Administration county offices. Long-term loans for purchasing or developing family-type farms are also available, either as direct or insured farm ownership loans.

A special program of loans to stockmen hard hit by drought conditions is also administered by the agency. These loans are to help farmers remain in normal production of cattle and sheep.
