LAWS REGULATING THE PRACTICE OF PHARMACY

It was not until 1880 that a license from the State was required to practice Pharmacy in North Carolina.

Following the enforcement of that law, however, more and more laws have been enacted to control and regulate the sale of drugs.

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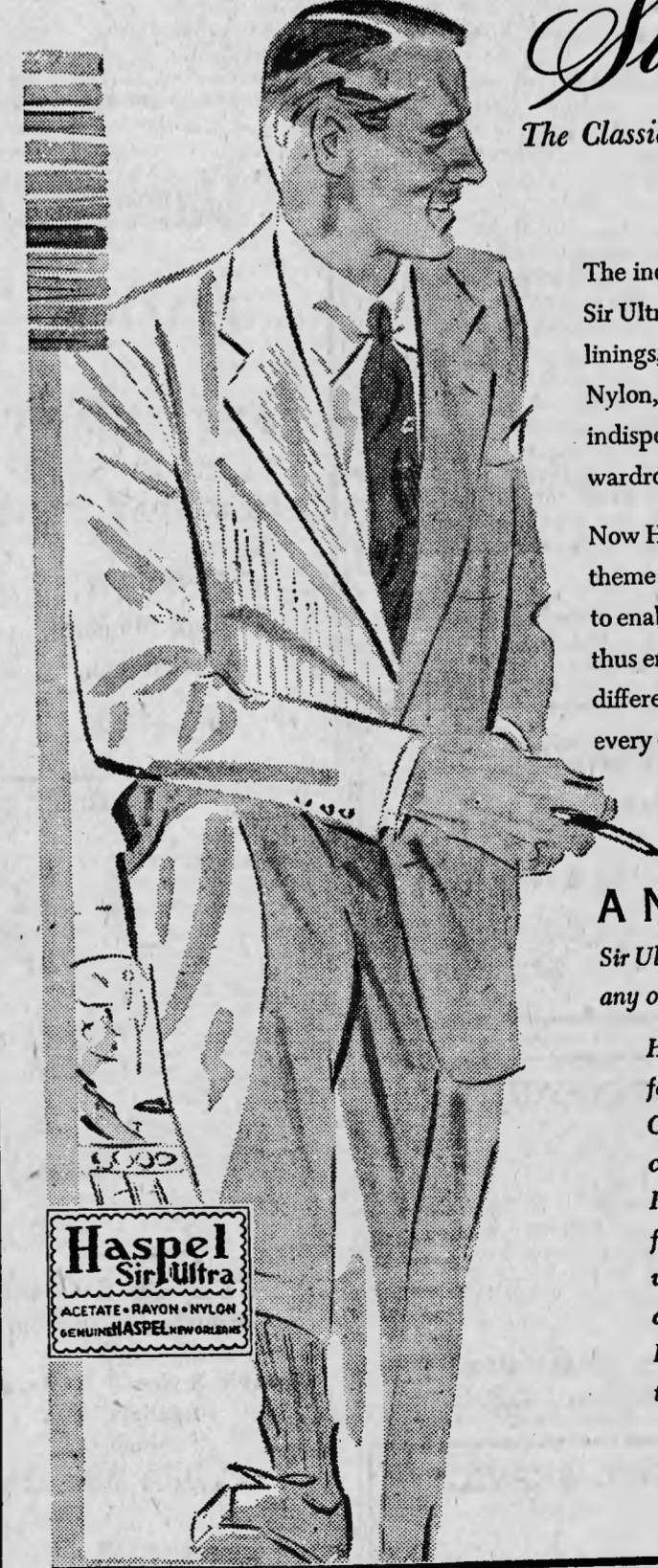
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
