Stabilization Checks Due Leaf Farmers In Moore

Cooperative Wants Information About Where Persons Are

A number of Moore County tobacco farmers, who are members of the Flue Cured Cooperative Tobacco Stabilization Corporation, have not received checks due them from the corporation for the years 1947 through 1950, according to L. T. Weeks, general manager.

Because of incorrect addresses or other reasons the cooperative has not been able to deliver these checks, Weeks explained. He asked persons listed or any one who knows where these persons are to contact the Stabilization Corporation at P. O. Box 2718, Raleigh. **Information Required**

Identification card number and pink agreement and receipt should be sent with requests for checks, Weeks said.

If this information is not available, he asked the farmers to send as much of the following information as possible: 1. Copies of warehouse bills for the crop years in question; 2. Copies of settlement memorandums describing tobacco delivered to the Stabilization Corporation for the three years in question; 3. Marketing quota number for the crop years in question; 4. Correct name and address; 5. Name of landlord or tenants for the crop years in question.

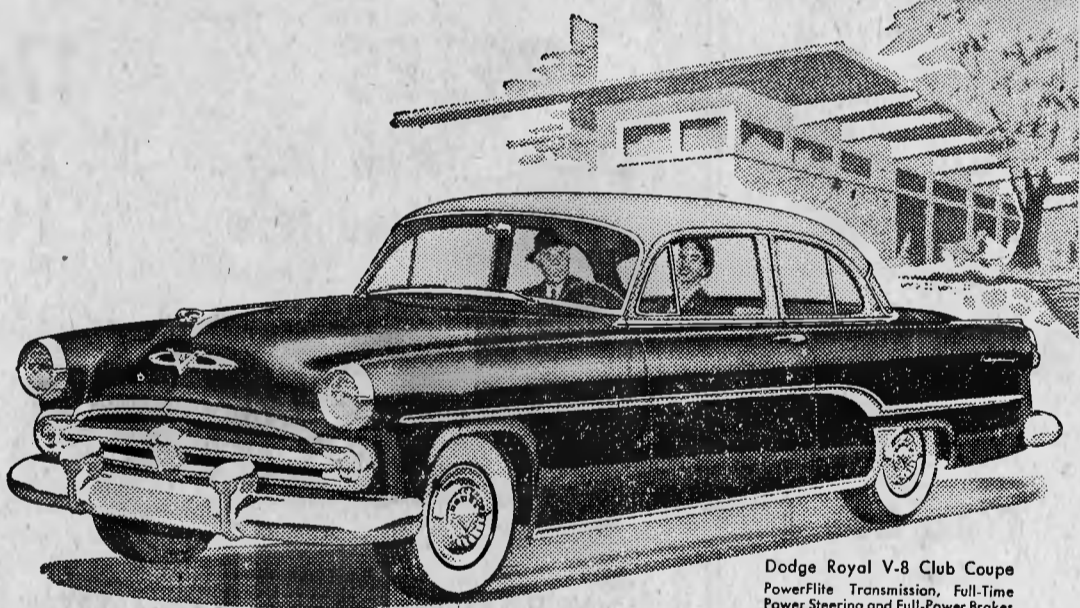

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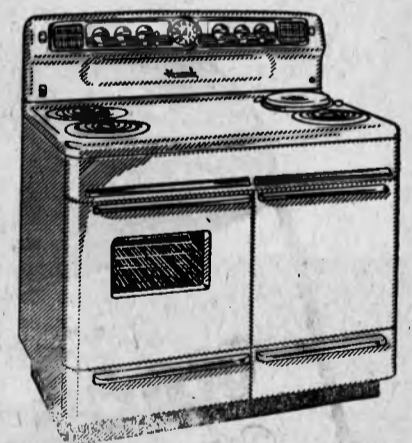
