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Traffic, Liquor Cases Predominate In This Week's Session Recorders Court

Man Loses License, Pays Big Fine For Speeding 90 M.P.H.

Traffic and liquor cases predominated in a session of recorders court Monday at Carthage, with court adjourning at the unusually early hour of 4:30 p.m. Judge J. Vance Rowe was on the bench and Solicitor W. Lamont Brown prosecuted the docket.

Because of a heavy backlog of cases, court has been scheduled for both Monday and Tuesday of next week.

ule each week and with the help of county agents, both treated and untreated fields will be checked regularly in some 16 counties. Many extension agents plan to

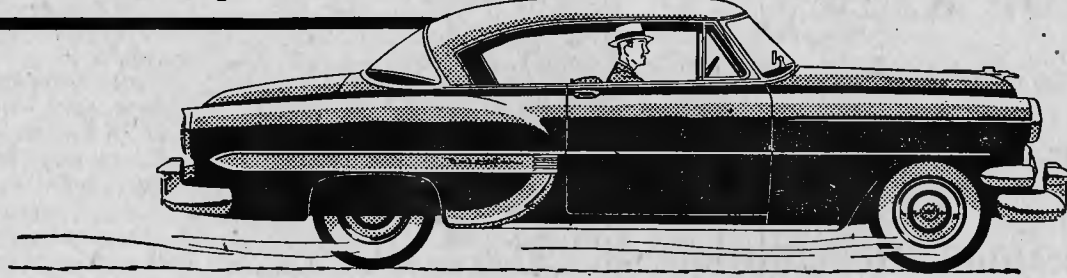
make regular weekly "counts" in fields during the summer.
