Good Pasture Is Key To Success With Livestock

Pasture grasses and clovers are the cheapest and most nutritious feed we can give livestock. High quality meat and milk can be produced economically on permanent pasture if a sufficient amount of pasture is provided. However, most livestock producers have a tendency to underplant and overgraze their pasture which gets them into trouble and especially in dry summers such as this one.

Dry summers are a big problem, it is true, but there is an answer to the problem; and farmers who follow good pasture management practices will be the ones who will make money out of their livestock. With the cost-price squeeze facing farmers these days, it is necessary to get every pound of meat and milk from our livestock that is possible.

It is just as important that these products be produced at the lowest cost in order to make a profit. Pasture is the answer to low-cost production, but only when enough of the right kind of pasture is provided for our animals.

There are a few simple rules which we can go by to increase livestock profits in this section of North Carolina through the use of pasture. First, select a pasture plant that will grow well on the type of soil which you have (Ladino Clover and Orchard Grass are not adapted to sandy soils); second, allow a newly-seeded pasture to become well established with five or six inches of growth before turning animals on it to graze. Young pastures can be ruined by grazing too early; third, plant enough pasture for the number of animals you intend to graze—two acres per cow is a minimum to insure good grazing.

Now is the time to prepare your land for seeding pasture and also crops for winter and early spring grazing. Small grain crops provide excellent winter grazing and can be cut for hay if not needed in the spring.

Don't let dry weather catch you unprepared next year—seed plenty of permanent pasture now.

Major Dieterich, Local Resident Wins Decoration

Major Virgil C. Dieterich, a member of the staff of the USAF Air - Ground Operations School, was decorated with the Commendation Ribbon Friday in a formal ceremony, by the commandant, Brig. Gen. Daniel W. Jenkins.

His extensive knowledge of air ground tactics and combat experience proved invaluable in the production of this film which will for years concisely and comprehensively demonstrate the basic concepts, principles, and application of air power to naval, ground, and air force personnel of many nations, the citation accompanying the ribbon stated.

Major Dieterich is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Dieterich of Norton, Kansas. He and his wife, the former Freda Rundell of Norton, Kansas, have two children; Nancy Kay, age 8 and James Milton, age 6. They are presently residing at 380 Kensington Road, Southern Pines. However, Major Dieterich has received orders to report to Ramstein, Germany and will leave September 1 for this new assignment.

Major Dieterich attended the University of Kansas prior to entering Military Service in September, 1942. During World War II, he served as an F-51 Pilot in Europe and was credited with 73 combat missions.

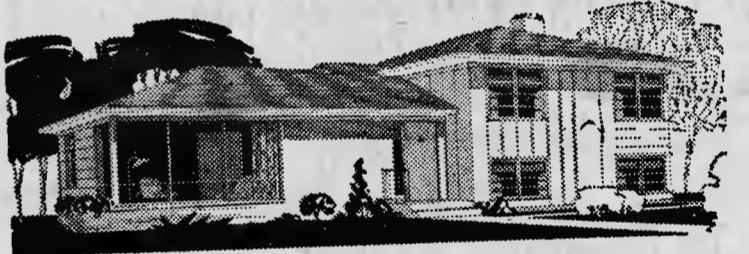
