As reported soon afterwards in The Pilot, the property was transferred from Mr. Hancock to the Historical Association June 18. Purchase of the property by

the State has been approved, it is understood, by the State Historic Sites Commission. Mrs. Ernest L. Ives of Southern Pines, a leader in the activities of the Historical Association, is a member of the commission.

Operation and maintenance of the property, after it is acquired by the State, will be a local responsibility, Mr. Hodgkins states. Reimbursement of the purchase price by the State would make funds for maintenance available. The report says that George Maurice of Eagle Springs, a member of the Association and leader in the Alston House project, estimates immediate needed repairs on the house as costing \$2,000. The Association is making plans to raise additional funds for the project later, the report states.

Appreciation is expressed in the report to Highway Commissioner Forrest Lockey of Aberdeen for work that has begun on a road to the house. A parking lot will be constructed later, the report says.
