

Kelly Promoted By County Police In Mecklenburg

L. A. Kelly, Moore County native who is head of identification work with the Mecklenburg County police department, has been promoted to lieutenant in the department, it was announced this week. He has been identification officer with the department for the past year.

Mr. Kelly is a brother of Mrs. T. L. Campbell of 340 N. Page St. and W. B. Kelly of near Carthage. He is a former deputy sheriff in this county. His wife is the former Marie Adcox of Pinebluff. They have two children, Larry, 16, and Beverley, 12.

Another honor is due Lt. Kelly when he attends the meeting of the International Association of Identification Officers to be held in Bermuda, September 9-14. Now first vice-president of the organization, he will become president during the gathering.

Lt. Kelly went to the Mecklenburg police department after having held the position of chief of the identification section of the 27th military police crime laboratory, European Command, United States Army.

He established the identification bureaus at Durham and Fayetteville, later becoming a civilian employe of the Army. He has studied under Dr. Harry Soderman of Stockholm, Sweden, an international authority on identification.
