

Zaremba To Perform At Flora Macdonald

Sylvia Zaremba, brilliant and already famous young concert pianist, will be presented in recital at Flora Macdonald College, Red Springs, on Thursday evening, November 4, at 8:15, in the course of her seventh transcontinental tour. The concert is open to the public.

Despite her youth, Miss Zaremba is today a veteran of the concert stage—she has made over 40

appearances with great symphony orchestras, including six with the New York Philharmonic.

Her program at Flora Macdonald will include compositions of Bach, Brahms, Beethoven, Bartok, Ravel and four of Chopin's.
