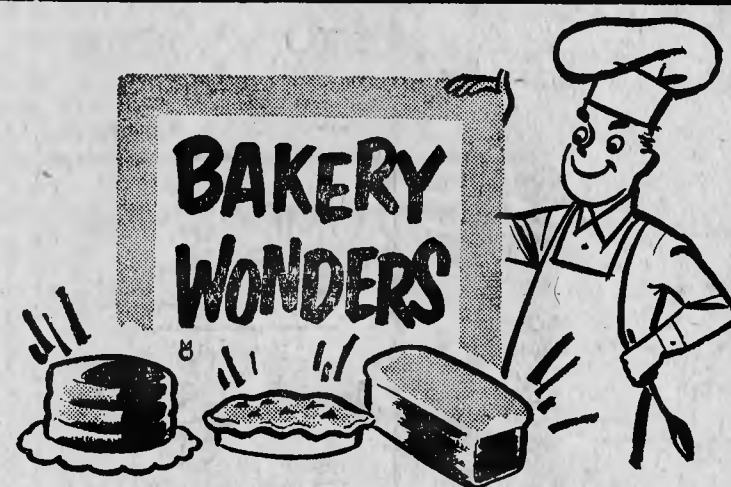

Mrs. Neill McKay and sons of Greensboro were Sunday guests of their mother, Mrs. Sadie K. Wall.

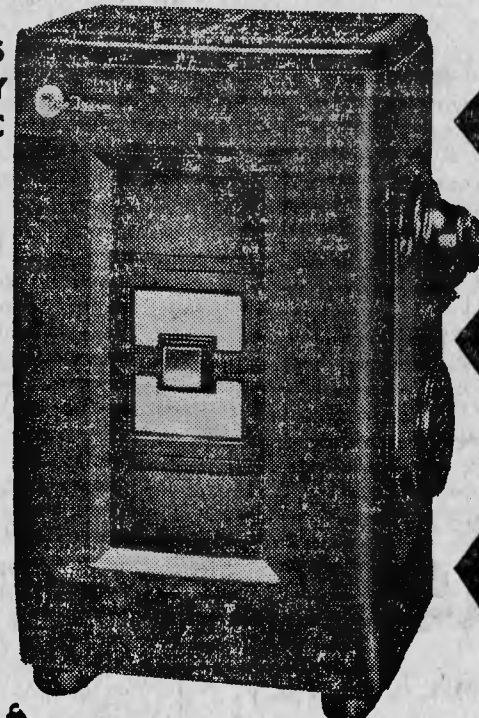
Sale, Supper Saturday At McDonald's Chapel
