Made At Hearing

Toll-Free Service Here To Pinehurst. Aberdeen Is Planned

Telephone toll service between Southern Pines and Pinehurst and between Southern Pines and Aberdeen, is expected to be a thing of the past before the end of next year. No objections to the proposed "Extended Area Service" offered by the United Telephone Company of the Carolinas, Inc., were offered at a hearing before the North Carolina Utilities Comnission held in Raleigh Monday.

With Commissioner Harry Westcott presiding, E. W. Smail, representing the telephone company, outlined the plans for a changeover from the present toll system to direct dialing between the towns. He cited the costs involved in inaugurating the new service, and the loss of revenue from current toll charges, and submitted a proposed monthly rate schedule to offset these. He gave the net revenue loss as \$22,969 annually, and stated that the upward revision of rates prepared by the company would bring in approxmately \$23,000.
