The town council took under consideration Tuesday night a proposal that the town increase its advertising budget and team with hotels and other interested businesses in a coordinated advertising program to promote the resort industry of Southern Pines.

The suggestion came from Charles W. Stitzer, owner of the Highland Pines Inn, a resort hotel now occupied by the USAF Air Ground Operations School.

Mr. Stitzer recalled that between seven and 10 years ago, the hotels and the town together were spending some \$15,000 per year on resort advertising, with about \$4,000 from the town.
